AFFORDABLE HOUSING UPDATE

Even though housing prices have softened somewhat in the current recession, the median single family home sale price of the lowest 25 % of sales in 2011 was \$368,750, still out of reach for those on limited incomes. The housing market on the Cape is 10 % higher, yet wages are 35 % lower than in the rest of the Commonwealth. In this challenging environment, meeting the need for affordable housing seems more dream than reality. Yet OCF Members heard from speaker, John Holt, Vice-Chairman of the Town's Affordable Housing Committee, that there is some light on the horizon for Orleans. If all goes as planned, four new houses can be built within the next two years on a plot off of Route 6A--the Hinckley Project. Vicki Goldsmith. Executive Director of Habitat, offered more good news: in mid-March a single working mom and her daughter, a student at Orleans Elementary, moved into their Habitat-built home on Nickerson Rd. Theirs is the first first such home in Orleans in six years, and the 75th on the Cape.

A group of about 30 OCF members were privileged to hear the foregoing update and join in a discussion at the second annual Members Only Coffee Gathering held March 17, hosted by the Orleans Inn. More information on Affordable Housing presented at that event can be found at orleanscitizensforum.org

A forum examining the implications of our changing demographics and the impact on health care, home values and support services, was sponsored by the OCF in December, 2011.

The OCF invited community leaders to be the panelists: - Anne Van Vleck, **Executive Director of Cape** Cod Young Professionals, Dr. Timothy Reed, physician and owner, Orleans Medical Center, William von Thaden, President, von Thaden Builders, Thomas F. Cronin, President, American Heritage Realty, and Patrick J. Kane, Sr. VP, Marketing Communications and Business Development, Cape Cod Health Care.

Each panelist described the changing demographics of Orleans and Cape Cod - the aging population and the loss of young professionals - from their professional, and often, personal perspective.
